# EXTRAVAGANT WORSHIP

As I read about the elaborate and extravagant construction and furnishing of the temple built during Solomon's reign, I was reminded of some of the beautiful cathedrals that man has built through the ages. Even as I have admired their artistic design, I have wondered if the expense that they represent was a bit excessive.

In India I visited the Taj Mahal.
Outside its gates were the constant reminders of the country's poverty.
Inside was the rich Emperor Shah Jahan's tribute to his wife that is so stunningly beautiful that it takes your



breath away. The perfect white marble and serene surroundings stood in stark contrast to the sick children begging just yards away. I felt guilty enjoying such beauty in the midst of so much misery. Shah Jahan's wife, no matter what her lovely qualities may have been, was a mere mortal woman. But what if she had been more? What if she was the living Savior of the world? Then would the extravagance have been worth it?

It is the construction of Solomon's temple that inspired those who designed the great Gothic cathedrals and the basilicas of the Renaissance (Schippe and Stetson 101).

# **HOW HIGH?**

Because some manuscripts list the height of the temple as 120 cubits in 2 Chron. 3:4 instead 20, there is some controversy about the actual height of Solomon's temple. If the 120 cubits is correct, that would make the structure around 20 stories tall!

# **ARTIFACTS**

An ivory pomegranate (shown about its actual size) may be the only artifact from Solomon's temple, though it is still in dispute.

We do know from 2 Chron. 4:13 that 400 pomegranates were made to decorate the tops of the pillars.


# GOD'S DWELLING PLACE 2 Chron. 7

When Solomon finished praying, fire came down from heaven and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices, and the glory of the Lord filled the temple. 2 Chron. 7:1

Can you imagine what that must have been like for the people witnessing it? I watched and listened to a volcano erupting and could hardly tear myself away from its wonder. If you have ever watched a lightening storm, or the angry waves of a stormy sea you know that sense of fearful awe. I can't imagine what it must have been like to have fire actually come down from heaven and burn up the offerings. What exactly was it like for God's Glory to fill the temple in such a way that the priests could not even enter? Can you imagine the kind of respect and awe that the people must have had for the temple after that? How important would that make the temple in their daily lives?

where is God's temple located now (1 Cor.3:16,17)?
God understands exactly what He is comparing us to. I don't feel God's Presence as keenly when
waiting in a line full of people at the grocery store as I do next to a mountain stream at the foot of a
majestic peak, but I should. It's the people who are created in His image as eternal beings. It is the
people that He desires to dwell in. He really does mean that His glory fills His holy temple whether
it be the extravagantly beautiful building that Solomon built, or our own humble, but divinely created
selves. How hard is it to see yourself as God's dwelling place?
How hard is it to see others as the dwelling place of a holy and per-
fect God?
What difference would it make if we did?
If the Israelites went to the temple to make their sacrifices and offer-
ings to God, then shouldn't we take Jesus, the once and for all sacrifice,
into all our relationships with the people set apart as His holy temple?
Uzzah died because the ark, or Presence of God was not treated with
great enough respect. If the Presence of God is in not only ourselves,
but the people around us, how important is it that we treat them with
the utmost honor and respect?
Do you?




# PUZZLE PAGE

**WEEK 24** HIRAM, PATRON OF THE MASONS The temple's bronze pillars were fashioned by Huram-Abi who was sent to King Solomon by King Hiram of Tyre. Those pillars became symbols for the builders and masons later known as the Freemason's. (Schippe and Stetson 101) In building the temple, only blocks dressed at the quarry were used, and no hammer, chisel or

any other iron tool was heard at the temple site

# TRADE ROUTE

1 Kings 9:15

The trade route between Mesopotamia (Assyria, Babylon and Persia) and Egypt went through Israel giving them significant importance among the world powers. Hazor, Megiddo and Gezer were important cities along this path of trade. Solomon was wise in beefing up these cities.
