Traveling God's Word

SPOTTING CHRIST

"When you want to believe in something, you also have to believe in everything that's necessary for believing in it." Ugo Betti

The message of Scripture is Christ. To believe in Christ, His death, burial and resurrection, and to respond to that belief in repentance and baptism is the essential core of our salvation. But to believe in the Christ of the New Testament, we must know the Lord of the Old. The primary purpose of the Old Testament, to introduce man to God, to show us and tell us who He is. However, we tend to separate the Testaments into man's encounter with only God the Father in the Old, and with God the Son in the New. But all Scripture is for the purpose of a saving relationship with our Lord. All of it is the story of our Lord going about the business of revealing Himself to mankind that they might know Him. He is helping us believe in what we need to believe in, in order to believe in the Godas-man Jesus. So, as we move into God's Word, keep in mind that what you are reading is not everything about Him, but what He has determined that we most need to know in order to come to a saving relationship with Him.

Learning the Language

There are two language issues to be dealt with as we read Scripture. One is the original language that they were written in. While God's thoughts and communication is not bound to the Old Testament language of Hebrew, or the New Testament language of Greek, those who actually first penned His words were obliged to write divine words in the constraints of human language. The Bible is further

The original language of the Old Testament was Hebrew. The Hebrew names of the books came from the first words in the book, but the names that we are accustomed to are translated from the later Greek version of the Old Testament called the Septuagint. For example, in Hebrew the name of Genesis is *beresit*. Genesis is actually the Greek word for beginning.

translated into a language familiar to us, but sometimes the depth of meaning is dulled in the translation. For that reason, we will occasionally take a look of the meanings of the original Hebrew and Greek words and phrases used.

The second and larger issue of language that can hinder the transforming work of God's Word in our lives is that we tend to deal with the size of God by cutting His Word into tiny morsels. While that can be a good aid to digestion, it can also keep us from seeing the big picture. Sometimes we will zoom in on a single verse, phrase or even word, but I hope to also step back once in awhile to remind ourselves of the big picture and the narrative being told. The verses that we harvest from the Bible and transplant one by one into our hearts are treasures to hold, but so is the context from which they came.
