### Christ's Passover

While we have only subtle clues to the timing of Christ's birth, there is little question left by Scripture about the season of His death. The gospels clearly plant the events of the final week of Jesus as the week surrounding Passover. Christians know the days leading up to and including the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ as Passion Week. Of the sixteen chapters in the book of Mark, covering the three years of the public ministry of Christ, five of those chapters are devoted to the events of this one week. Passover, the central event of Jewish life, is also the turning point of the gospel story, and the central event of Christian life.

Answers and Sources

I have also come to marvel at the way God uses unknowing players in His story. The actions of those who oppose Him serve to fulfill God's words and promises. From Pilate and Herod finding the sacrificial Lamb to be without blemish, to the Muslims sealing the Eastern gate of the Temple, unwittingly confirming that God had passed through, I find great comfort in the display of God's Sovereign reign.

What does Peter say about God's involvement in the crucifixion of Christ in his speech on the Day of Pentecost in Acts 2:23?

The non biblical additions to the Passover celebration made by rabbis who did not recognize the Messiah, still serve to point to Him. The Jewish people are still living in the role of messengers of the gospel even when they themselves do not fully understand the message. And, perhaps, that is true of us as well.

#### **Passover Timeline**

I have to admit that I have, in the past, found little interest in the details and sequence recorded in the gospels surrounding the last week of Christ. It has seemed much more interesting to me to focus on the more "spiritual" elements that Christ seems to be squeezing into these last days of His earthly ministry. After all, this is His last earthly chance to instruct His followers in the really important things they will need to know in His absence. Yet, the same argument can be said for those little tidbits that are a mystery to my western mind. They have not interested me only because I was ignorant of the depth of riches to be found there! God does not waste words, so we can trust that if He says it, it matters. So here I have tried to sort a small portion of the events into the timeframe in which they were divinely constructed.

#### LAMB BROUGHT TO THE TEMPLE - TRIUMPHAL ENTRY

In John 11, what miracle had Jesus performed that aroused the unease of the Jewish leaders?
What was the prophecy delivered by Caiaphas in John 11:49-51?
According to John 12:1, when did Jesus arrive again in Bethany?
What significant act did Mary perform while He was there?
On what day did Jesus leave Bethany, and travel the two miles to Jerusalem? (John 12:12-13)On what day were the Israelites to set aside the lamb designated as the sacrifice for Passover in Exodus 12:3

At the time of the New Testament, the custom was for the high priest to select a representative Passover lamb from the some 250,000 lambs brought to the temple for the Passover sacrifice from where they were raised in Bethlehem. They would circle around Jerusalem from the Bethlehem to the southwest, and enter Jerusalem through the Sheep Gate on the north side of the temple. Jesus approached Jerusalem from Bethany, to the east, and would have entered Jerusalem through the East Gate. With an estimated 2.5 million people in Jerusalem, there were many gathered for the occasion of the entrance of the sacrificial lambs, especially the lamb personally ushered in by the high priest. Thus, at the time of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, there were already large crowds gathered.

#### THE EAST GATE

Considering the prophet Ezekiel's words in 44:1-2, what is the signifi-

Because of the Jewish belief that the Messiah would come through the Eastern Gate of the temple, the Muslims sealed up the gate to prevent the arrival of the Messiah, unwittingly fulfilling the prophecy of Ezekiel. The Mount of Olives faces the east gate, and its slope is covered with a Jewish cemetery awaiting the resurrection of the dead that will come with the Messiah. A Muslim graveyard is directly in front of the gate, also awaiting resurrection.

GETHSEMANE	Late in the	night (	(Nisan 14	)
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Where did Jesus and the disciples spend the night during the time of testing in Jerusalem? (Luke 21:37)

The Mount of Olives, and the Garden of Gethsemane would have been on the way back to Bethany, so likely they returned to the home of their friends, or possibly just slept in the open. Space in, and around, Jerusalem would have been at a premium this week! The Garden of Gethsemane would have been a natural place for Jesus to pause and pray. Maybe he was waiting for the betrayal of Judas and the arrival of the soldiers who would arrest him as well.

What did He pray in Matt. 26:39?

Peter, at least, followed as close as the courtyard where we know he remained until morning was announced by the crowing of a rooster.

#### THIRD HOUR (9:00 am Nisan 14)

Remembering that the Jewish people under Roman rule began counting the hour of the day with sunrise at 6:00 am, what time does Mark say Jesus was nailed to the cross in Mark 15:25?

This is the time of the first of three temple services of the day, and the time of the morning sacrifice. It is significant that the events of the arrest and trial happened at night, when the numerous supporters of Jesus would have already retired for the night. The crucifixion happened when they were at the temple service. Imagine their shock and sorrow upon finding Jesus nailed to the cross!

#### **EVENING SACRIFICES** (3:00 pm Nisan 14)

Evening sacrifices at the temple were at 3:00 pm. They were announced by a blast of the shofar, which in Jewish tradition was reminiscent of the trumpet (shofar) blast heard by the Israelites when God descended on Mt. Sinai (see Exodus 19:16-19). To the Jews, the blast of the shofar was like the voice of God. Even from the cross, this call to sacrifice could be heard. Likely, Jesus heard the shofar, and knew the time had come.

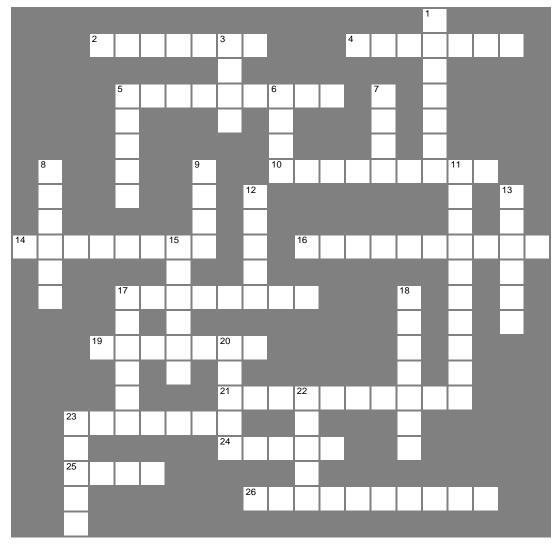

#### THE BURIAL

If any of the feasts of the Lord happened to fall on a Sabbath day, it was to be celebrated a day earlier, so would begin on Thursday evening, and be completed by sundown (6pm) on Friday evening which was the beginning of the Sabbath.





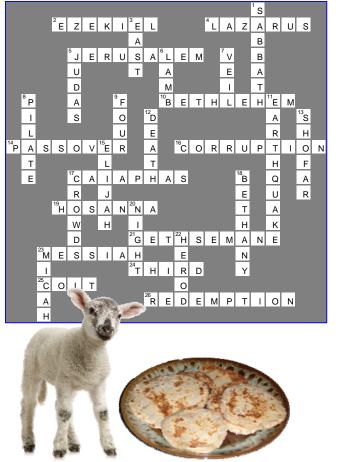

#### The Message Continues

Even elements of the Passover Seder that do not appear in Scripture, but have been added by the rabbis through the centuries seem to point toward Jesus Christ as the Passover lamb.

Part of the traditional Passover Seder still practiced today includes a separate cup and empty chair for Elijah. Additionally, at the end of the supper a child will open the door to see if Elijah might be standing there. This is a custom initiated by rabbis based on the words of Malachi 3:1, and 4:5. Because Elijah did not die, but ascended into heaven (2 Kings 2:11), it was thought that he would one day return to announce the coming of the Messiah.

To the Jew, Passover is not only a time to celebrate their redemption from slavery and death, but also a time that they expect redemption to come again. At the time of Jesus, expectation was high.  What did John the Baptist say about Jesus in John 1:29 -31?

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
