

## A SURE FOUNDATION

The purpose of this class is twofold. I hope we can strengthen our own faith by examining, questioning, and knowing what we believe, choosing the right materials to build our faith. I also hope that we will be better prepared to demonstrate to others what a holy dwelling place looks like, and where it comes from!

and where it comes from! The foundation is the most load bearing part of any structure. Usually, the bulk of the foundation lies unseen and is only evident by the integrity of the structure itself. Perhaps that's why the ceremonial cornerstone came to be. It's a public proclamation of the date and purpose on which a building was founded. This week try to notice the cornerstones on many of our public buildings. Many contain a time capsule to preserve a knowledge of the people who built the structure. What does God have to say in Job 38:3-7 about the foundation and cornerstone that He laid? \_\_\_\_ In my Webster's dictionary, there are two meanings for the word cornerstone. One is: the stone laid at the corner of the wall during a formal ceremony. The second is: the most basic element. What does Psalm 118:22 say about the cornerstone? This verse was faithfully recited during the Jewish Passover, but the builders (religious leaders) failed to actually include the cornerstone when it came down to it. What does Jesus say in Luke 20:17 about the person who falls on that stone? \_\_\_\_\_\_ What was God's intention for that cornerstone in Isaiah 28:16? How did Peter build on these ideas in 1 Peter 2:1-10? What does Acts 4:11-12 say will happen if we build on that stone? How is Jesus our cornerstone in both regards of its meaning? Our memory verse for this week is also the overriding theme for the entire year. In 1 Corinthians 3, Paul is addressing a problem with the Corinthian believers that we can easily fall into ourselves. He wants to address them as the spiritual people that they should be, but he can't because they haven't built on the foundation that they were given. In 1 Cor. 3:11, what is the foundation that has already been laid? Why does it matter what we build on that foundation? (1 Cor. 3:12-17) It is important that we build with the same material as the foundation itself so that it can withstand the test by fire. What are some of the immature and inferior ways that the Corinthians had built on their foundation in Christ? (3:1-10)\_\_\_\_\_\_ What are some ways that we might be tempted to use inferior building materials today?
